## President's Report

It is a pleasure to present my third Annual Report for the Zonta Club of Melbourne's East. I was again thrilled to be inducted to this role at the AGM in May 2017 by Area Director Jasmine Koch. Accepting the position for the third successive year was seen to be in the best interests of the club. Sincere thanks must be given to Jasmine for her support and leadership over the past two years. I look forward to following on as Area One Director this year.

A very committed and supportive Board has ably assisted me in my role. My thanks go to Beverley Manzie, Vice President and Correspondence Secretary; Sylvia Kolarik, Secretary; Debbie Grinter, Treasurer; and Robyn Scholes, Director. Our smaller Board has allowed for more focused and effective meetings.

The Biennium Goal 3 (*Zonta International builds and sustains a vibrant global membership*) has been a priority this past year as we have sought to increase our membership. We have inducted four members and had expressions of interest from several others. Our necessary move to another venue allowed for expansion of advertising into new areas. At this stage I would like to record my thanks to Glenda Peck and Beverley Manzie for their particular efforts in this area.

## Schools Programs

We have been fortunate in building connections with several local schools and introducing them to the vision of Zonta. We were delighted when our club winner Ishka de Silva from Presbyterian Ladies College received the District 23 award for Young Women in Public Affairs. PLC has been very supportive of this program for the last three years.

We had another successful day at Avila College assembling one thousand Birthing Kits. Avila has been consistently supportive of this project for many years and we thank them for their support and will miss their future involvement.

Glen Waverley Secondary College invited our club to be part of their Active Community Engagement Program, which was a new initiative for that school. Over a four week period, we tackled the issue of Family Violence as seen through the eyes of Year 9 students; introduced them to the Walk in My Shoes Display; facilitated a session on Z clubs with Judy Rothe and organised them into assembling 400 Birthing Kits. It was a most rewarding time and we will work with GWSC again later this year.

In September we had a visit from the student leaders at Mount View Primary School informing us of their involvement with the Beekeeper Parade in Cambodia. These four young leaders spoke most capably with a sense of maturity and compassion. We assisted them with a donation and purchased some of their products which were later used as Christmas gifts for children in a refuge.

This year we have begun collaborating with staff at Brentwood Secondary School to provide a scholarship for a female student participating in their Aerospace Program. We are hopeful this award will be named the Zonta Club of Melbourne's East Amelia Earhart School Scholarship and will be valued at \$750.

In December I attended the Ashwood High School Presentation Night to award two Year 11 female students with a scholarship to the value of \$750. These two remarkable girls have a wonderful commitment to furthering their education despite experiencing many obstacles.

Involvement in all of these opportunities has been a privilege for myself and the members of our club. We have been able to promote the name of ZCME and Zonta International, living up to the ideal of empowering young women and girls across our community.

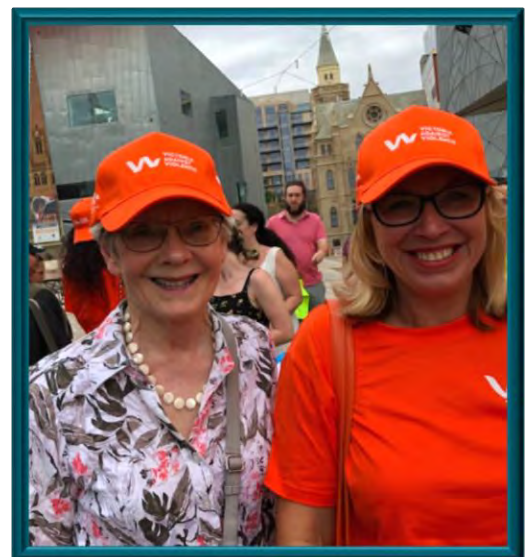

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# Service and Advocacy Report

The dedication of our Club members to reach the end goal of empowering women worldwide through service and advocacy is evident on so many levels.

## International

Our Club has always been diligent in donating one third of our Fundraising monies to Zonta International Foundation to enable the worthwhile International projects to be maintained. This year has been no different. By clearly stating the amount to be forwarded to ZI at the end of each fundraiser we are acknowledging the importance of supporting our International projects and ensuring that this money can help as soon as possible. For ZI to know that financial support is coming throughout the biennium rather than just at the end must make their budgeting easier. Similarly we all contribute to “Every member in November”. Although not a huge amount every little bit contributes to their budget.

## District

Our Club members continue to support our two District 23 project – Birthing Kits and Breast Care Cushions.

### Birthing Kit Assembly Days

Over the last twelve months we have conducted two, and assisted in a third Birthing Kit Assembly event, totalling 1,852 kits.

Once again Avila College students raised all the funds for the 1,000 kits, and assembled them on site with the aid of members, volunteers and teachers. We are grateful for the wonderful working relationship that had been developed with this school over several years. Sadly, they have made the decision not to support this project for the foreseeable future, although we remain hopeful that some other means of including this project might be found.

The second assembly event was a new experience, in that we did a four-day, two-month stint talking about Zonta projects and Z Clubs, culminating with the assembly of 452 kits, with about 60 students from Glen Waverley Secondary College.

We would like to express our sincere thanks to Robyn’s Soap House for their assistance and support of this project through the year.

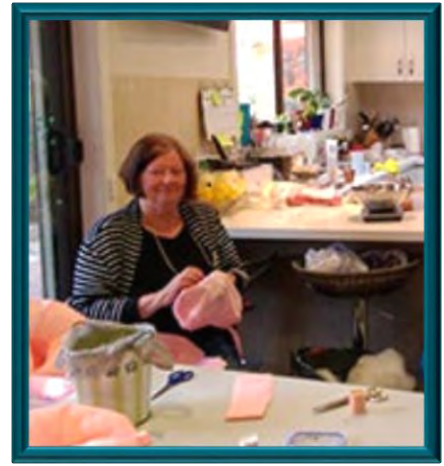


## Breast Care Cushions

## Local

Mt View Primary students approached us to come and speak at our meeting. These students had committed to a project to aid a village in Cambodia by installing solar panels on the houses. This provided power where there was none previously. The money to fund this was raised by the students through selling pencil cases and backpacks to the community. We assisted to the amount of \$500 for some goods and the rest a donation. We felt it was very important to assist these young people in their endeavours, not only to ensure that life in the village was improved but that we positively reinforce the endeavours of young people in their attempt to improve the lives of others.

We were also approached by Glen Waverley Secondary College to participate in their ACE (Active Community Engagement) program. Interestingly the students found our organisation and approached us due to our stand against family violence. After the four sessions the students and teachers went away with a good understanding about Zonta, a thought provoking and broader understanding of family violence, the awareness of Z Clubs with the possibility of forming one, and the satisfaction of assembling four hundred Birthing Kits that will help women in third world countries. We have been invited to participate again this year.

At the same time, we were the custodians of the Walk In My Shoes suitcase. We presented the stories of women who had walked away from family violence situations, to the students. The students' reactions were amazing, ranging from shock to disbelief. It confirmed our belief in WIMS as a powerful advocacy tool in promoting the rights of women to live in a world free from the fear of violence.

We were fortunate to then be able to exhibit the display at the Shire Offices for two weeks, and at the Monash and Clayton Libraries for two weeks. Feedback from these displays was positive. Our aim was to confront the public with the problem, which has been hidden for many years. We also used this as a follow-up to our Community Conversation: Family Violence – Changing Attitudes, Changing Behaviour project. Change is slow but with each activity we present we chip away at the problem.

We entered our project in the District 23 Service and Advocacy Awards. We were recognised for our participation and our project will be included in District's Advocacy Power point presentation.

Carmel Martin came to speak to us about Angel Flight, which is a volunteer organisation providing assistance for individuals being transported long distances to hospital. Be this for women, their children or their partners, it was felt that donating five hundred dollars, allowed women to be assisted at a very stressful time in their lives. Our donation showed that as Zontians we care and give support to women when needed.

We continue to support Kara House with gifts for children at Christmas and Cara Inc with pamper packs for their young women. This is something we are able to do with goods donated from members who can only imagine how difficult it must be for women who have little or nothing. The gifts are received with gratitude and bring some joy to women's lives.

The Club feels that by supporting and recognising amazing young women in our community we are fostering future leaders and acknowledging community commitment that engenders change. We have supported several young women through the following scholarships.

## Young Women in Public Affairs (YWPA)

Our last two Club winners, Nandini Karthikeyan (District 23 and International winner) and Ishka de Silva (District 23 winner), spoke at our District 23 Conference in Geelong in September 2017. What a proud moment it was for our Club and for Zonta in general. These two YWPA winners epitomise the values of Zonta as they look towards education for young women in third world countries, better health services, and equal rights in work places. Both Nandini and Ishka are anticipating careers and life paths where they aim to improve the quality of women's lives.

Our newly announced YWPA winner is Pravini de Silva who is another dynamic and focussed young woman endeavouring to make a huge difference to the lives of women.

Our Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarship Club winner was Sarsha Crawley. This award fosters women in business to take on leadership roles. As we all know there are few women in leadership positions in the financial world. We assisted Sarsha through our award to pursue further education overseas.

We reinvented our Club Scholarship award to a young woman at a local school to help her continue with her educational aims. We awarded scholarships to Juliette Wanis and Talia Simone at Ashwood High School (see photo P.5). It was felt that the two girls were equally worthy and due to our recognition of their abilities both will prosper and achieve valuable careers. We believe that education is the answer to change so to provide these scholarships creates a passageway to better lives.

We recently approached Brentwood Secondary College with the view of financially assisting a young woman in Years Ten or Eleven to participate in their Aerospace Learning Centre. This centre teaches the rudiments of flying and provides the opportunity for students to have flying instruction at Moorabbin Airport. Currently the course is weighted to male participants. With Amelia Earhart as our inspiration we feel that we can encourage young women to enter a field that has been dominated by men for a long time.

Usually we have chosen our "Woman Of Achievement" recipient and presented her with the award as part of our International Women's Day celebration. This has not been the case this year as we have decided to change the criteria of selection. Also we felt it would be appropriate to have this as part of our 40<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations.

## Treasurer's Report: April 2017 to March 2018

It is with great pleasure that I present my Treasurer's report to our club for the year April 1st to March 31st, 2018. We have had a productive year for the Zonta Club of Melbourne's East with our fundraising activities maintaining a healthy bank account. The highlights of our fundraising year were the Peridot Theatre night and two Sausage Sizzle days at Bunnings Notting Hill.

These and other combined activities contributed to a total net income of \$8245.30 to our account. These funds have enabled us to support the diverse range of social service activities being Zonta International, Women of Achievement Award, Angel Flight donation and Ashwood Secondary College Scholarships.

We maintained our annual fees at \$195.00.

The account balance opened at \$11,346.90 with the club raising \$8245.30 from fundraising activities, an increase of \$1765.71 on last year. The general account sits at \$3368.35 and our fundraising account is \$9681.23 The ING Business Optimiser account contributed interest of \$123.48 for the year.
